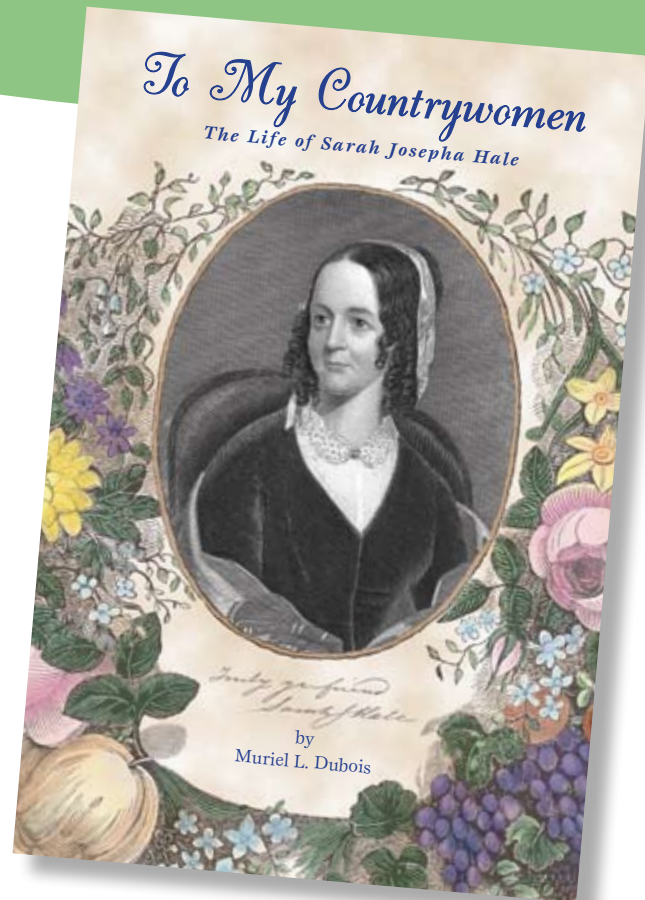
To My Countrywomen: The Life of Sarah Josepha Hale

- ☛ *supported the Perkins School for the Blind*
- ☛ *worked for women's property rights*
- ☛ *championed America's national Thanksgiving holiday*
